
Wow Wrens! What a fantastic start to the new term we have had. Mrs Earle and I have both been blown away with how confident and ready to learn you are.

We have started out topic 'If You Go Down to the Woods Today...' by learning about different habitats and woodland animals. Over the last two weeks we have sorted animals into their correct habitats and created our own woodland, thinking carefully about where the different animals live within a woodland.

In maths we have been looking at comparing numbers to 5 and bonds to 5. We have become very confident realling some number facts and have been looking at writing these number facts as a number sentence. Next week we are moving onto mass and capacity.

In English we have been reading the story 'We're Going on a Bear Hunt'. We are fantastic at retelling the story using Makaton signs and have created story maps to help us recall the main events in the story. Next week we are going to innovate the story.

Have a wonderful weekend! Continue to look at your Spelling and Sounds book to see what sounds we have been learning. You can practise these at home.



We have been enjoying our Music topic, combined with PE and Art. We have listened to the piano compositions of Italian musician Alberto Guirioli; responding to his beat, rhythm, tempo and creating movements and drawings alongside it. One piece we've listened a lot to is 'London' and we discovered that it was composed on a street piano at St Pancras station, before he was able to have a piano himself, at his London flat.

In Maths we completed our learning about Weight & Volume and have been revising Doubles to develop our fluency. Next we will focus on Place Value within 10, checking we know one more and one less, greater and less than equations and seeing if we can complete missing numbers on number tracks and number lines. In English we have been working very hard on our writing. We are ensuring the use of our 'non-negotiables', and have been using our environment to help us be successful, such as sound mats, word banks and our 'robot arms'. This is taking very good shape!



# WOODPECKERS



It has been a wonderful first couple of weeks of the Spring term in Kingfishers. They have returned to school ready and eager to learn and they have immersed themselves in our new topics.

In English we are studying the author Quentin Blake. The children are really enjoying his whacky stories and his brilliant illustrations. Next week we are starting our book review on one of his books 'Patrick'.

In Maths we are continuing with addition and subtraction whilst introducing other methods such as number lines and bar models.

In Science we are exploring Materials and the children have enjoyed researching and experimenting with a range of Materials and items, with a focus on their properties.

In History we have been exploring Castles and Forts.

Kingfishers have shown lots of interest in this topic and have enjoyed learning about the purpose of these buildings, along with who lived in them and their defenses.

In grammar we have been consolidating our understanding of Nouns, Verbs and Adjectives and have introduced the concept behind using commas and adverbs. It has been great seeing them apply their new knowledge within their writing to make their sentences more detailed and interesting.

We've had a wonderfully productive couple of weeks in Woodpeckers class and the children have been very motivated and eager to learn.

In maths the children have progressed onto multiplication and division, where they have been focusing on equal groups and arrays. They have been using a range of concrete resources and images to support their understanding when explaining the link between repeated addition and multiplication. They have been exposed to examples where groups are equal but look different, such as a series of objects that are spaced differently.

In science, the children have been discussing what animals and humans need in terms of the right kind of nutrition. They have been investigating the different food groups and where our food comes from. They took some time to create their own meal based on the food groups discussed and the function of each food group.

Woodpeckers have now moved onto a new unit of english this term. They are now working towards writing an explanation text. So far, they have been investigating the main features of an explanation text. They were able to identify the use of writing in present tense, formal language and conjunctions. In more recent lessons, they have been researching the life cycle of a butterfly where they were set the task to find information about the four main stages. They then produced a fact file and then completed their own drawing to represent the life.







What a wonderful first couple of weeks we have had back in Kestrels class. We have really enjoyed starting a new year on some fresh and new topics. In English, we have started looking at discussion texts. This has been guite challenging as it is a very new concept but we have really enjoyed debating topics and giving our viewpoints. In maths, we have worked really hard on finding the area of different shapes and have really mastered the concept! Our new topic of animals including humans has been very popular so far and we really enjoyed our practical lesson on the digestive system as well as starting to understand the different types of teeth that we have and how they are used for different types of chewing. In RE, we have started to learn about different creation stories across religions and this has sparked some really interesting conversations. During enrichment, we have absolutely loved having Mrs Lonnen-Smith in to look at impressionist painting and I know the children are very excited to get going with their final designs next week. Our new topic in history is Maya and this week we learnt all about how they were one of the first civilizations to invent the concept of 0, which was represented by a shell!

Ospreys have started off the new term with a 'spring' in their step. They have been working incredibly hard and we are really starting to see some super academic progress from them all. One of the things that I have seen a real improvement in is their pieces of creative writing. It is getting more technical and is a real joy to read. In Science (after a few initial gigales) the children are enjoying their new topic of Birth to Old Age. We have spoken about some of the changes that occur from the moment of fertilisation to old age. We mostly focused on physical changes the body goes through and once the children felt more confident, the questions didn't stop coming! This week we had a look at some data around the growth of babies. We talked about the different ways in which data can be represented and felt that a line graph would be the most suitable to compare the growth rate of girls and boys. I was really impressed with the care and careful presentation of the children's graphs. In English, we have been working through the features of a ghost story and we have loved learning about how to create suspense in writing. We have studied lots of different sentence types in order to achieve this.



OWLS



What a start to the new term we have had in Owls class. Our fractions journey is finally coming to an end as we have now learnt how to simplify fractions, add fractions, subtract fractions, multiply fractions, divide fractions, find fractions of amounts and find the whole when given a fraction. Finally, culminating in the application of all of the above. This proved the most challenging, remembering which methods to use for the different areas. We will recap fractions towards the end of the year before sending them on their way to secondary school. In English, our journalistic writing unit is coming along nicely with the children working hard to piece the building blocks together to write their very own newspaper article. We have loved learning about light in science, this week we investigated how light is reflected. Owls have also been developing their understanding of the Indus Valley (the ancient civilization we are studying) through understanding some of the significant discoveries that were made and who by.
