Objectives

1. Engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity, for example by:

- providing targeted activities or support to involve and encourage the least active children
- encouraging active play during break times and lunchtimes
- establishing, extending or funding attendance of school sport clubs and activities and holiday clubs, or broadening the variety offered
- adopting an active mile initiative
- raising attainment in primary school swimming to meet requirements of the national curriculum before the end of key stage 2. Every child should leave primary school able to swim.

2. Profile of PE and sport is raised across the schoolas a tool for whole-school improvement, for example by:

- encouraging pupils to take on leadership or volunteer roles that support sport and physical activity within the school (such as 'sport leader' or peer-mentoring schemes)
- embedding physical activity into the school day through active travel to and from school, active break times and active lessons and teaching.

3. Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport, for example by:

- providing staff with professional development, mentoring, training and resources to help them teach PE and sport more effectively to all pupils,
 and embed physical activity across your school
- hiring qualified sports coaches to work alongside teachers to enhance or extend current opportunities.

4. Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils, for example by:

- introducing new sports and physical activities (such as dance, yoga or fitness sessions) to encourage more pupils to take up sport and physical activities
- partnering with other schools to run sport activities and clubs
- providing more (or broadening the variety of) extra-curricular activities after school in the 3 to 6pm window, delivered by the school or other local sport organisations.

5. Increased participation in competitive sport, for example by:

- increasing pupils' participation in the School Games
- organising, coordinating or entering more sport competitions or tournaments within the school or across the local area, including those run by sporting organisations.

Deliver training to sports captains to support them with their management of inter-house competitions and how to coach and support younger children within competitive environments. We were unable to take our year 6 children to a 25m swimming pool to assess their competence against the national requirements due to COVID restrictions. However, 95% of year 6 children demonstrated safe rescue skills and competent strokes over two 12 meter lengths. |

Unfortunately, this project was unable to take place this year due to Essex County Council performing repair works on our school roof and replacing all windows in the hall. To make the most of the new play surface, we installed a multi-use end goal unit for the children to use. The multi-use end goal unit contains a football goal, basketball hoop, cricket stumps and targets. This surface and facility is used every break time and lunch time to increase the opportunities for active play. It is also utilised during PE lessons and will be used by our netball club due to the original netball court being used by Essex as a car park. |

To provide CPD for staff members to deliver the Balance Bike programme to all EYFS children. | 100% of children to pass the balance bike programme and be confident when riding the balance bike and have the skills to maneuver the bikes safely and confidently. | £2,900 | 100% of EYFS children engage in balance bike training with all children passing the informal assessment system demonstrating an improved balance and physical literacy whilst on the balance bike. CPD delivered three members of staff to run balance bike sessions to all EYFS children. Balance bikes were also utilised during active play, sports day and physically active lessons throughout the year. |
